







Which Region are you Located in?




Which ATTA Stakeholder do you Represent? AUTISM TRAIL ASSIST

Tips for a successful transition...

Reach out and register with the college's disability services office. Registering with disability services provides a way for receiving accommodations.

Become familiar with ADA and ask about accommodations such as allowing for more time to get to class, note-takers in the class, and alternative testing locations.



More tips for a successful transition...

- Resident directors also need to understand that they may have a student with ASD who does not socialize and needs special living accommodations.
- Discuss and Practice how to Self –Advocate
- Discuss and Practice Disclosure Strategies





What to look for at a potential college

Study support

Peer mentoring opportunities

Individual and group counseling

One-on-one academic support and coaching

Planned social events

Career guidance



Tips for Faculty

- Break large assignments into smaller units to be turned in separately
- Provide direct feedback and set clear boundaries
- Provide ample response time for questions
- Provide a predicable routine

- Consider allowing use of technology or laptop for inclass work and note taking
- Allow for extra transition time
- Help with organizational supports (color coded binders and folders)
- Reminders of assignments

- Avoid use of idioms, metaphors, sarcasm, and jokes
- Consider assigning group roles
- Supplement oral instructions with visual (written instructions paired with graphics)
